About us


Solace Africa is a charitable Organisation that was founded by university students from Uganda Christian University in 2015. Many students could face challenges with tuition fees, leading to drop-out from university. We launched a "Save a buddy" initiative to fundraise for the financially challenged students, helping over 100 students within two years.

After graduation, we extended the philanthropy to young children (street/homeless children, orphans, poor children and children with disabilities). We carried out local fundraising to raise school fees, buy books and other scholastic materials, clothes and food for the needy children.

We have maintained this spirit, contributing a portion of our earnings to keep over 20 children in school.

With support from friends and partners, we hope to build a school and orphanage for children facing destitute conditions, offering both academic and vocational education especially for street, homeless and abandoned children. We welcome both financial, tangible materials and in-kind support as we work to change lives and build a brighter future for all children.

Situation Analysis

In many African countries, children face significant challenges that hinder their access to quality education, particularly in the context of poverty, limited resources, and social structures that prioritize survival over education.

There is a high possibility that at the death of a male parent, orphans will face discrimination among the family members, inequality, evictions from their home/land, or face financial constraints that may limit their chances to attain quality education and other social services.

The death of a female parent is also a big blow to orphans, especially in polygamous families, because stepmothers have a good record of child abuse in Uganda, mistreating their step children and denying them certain rights.

The 2013, Uganda Annual Crime Report showed that children continue to be vulnerable to abuse, neglect and exploitation. Child neglect, defilement and domestic violence were reported among the top 10 leading crimes in Uganda (Annual Crime Report 2013).

Child marriage continues to be a major problem with 12% of young girls getting married at 15 years of age while 57% are married by the age of 18 in Uganda (UNICEF 2014). On a sad note, the Adolescent Birth Rate is 156 per 1000 women (UNICEF 2012).

In rural areas, Children are more affected by child marriage at 33.1% compared to their counterparts in the urban setting (UNICEF 2014). In Uganda, only 30% of the children are registered at birth and only 1 in every 5 challenge.


compared to the rest of children, join street life, join criminal activities, or face other miserable situations compared to their counterparts.

OVCs are the most mistreated/abused, deprived from quality education and health care, homeless, starving category of children, and most of them lose hope to achieving their own potential in life.

Wakiso District for example has a record number of OVCs not only because of the highest urban population in Uganda, but because of urban challenges like high cost of living, poor housing and sanitation, HIV/AIDs, accidents, unemployment, divorce or separation of parents, wrangles and massive eviction from land and other challenges, OVCs get less chance to attain primary or secondary education.

According to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), more than 30 million children in Africa are out of school. For those who do have access to schooling, a large number will not transition to secondary or tertiary education due to economic pressures, family obligations, or lack of resources.


The recent statistics from Uganda show that out of 1,877,801 pupils enrolled in Primary One in 2012, only 671,923 were able to sit for PLE in 2018, 3456,695 sat for UCE and only 142,010 candidates of the same cohort managed to register for the 2024 UACE exams. This implies that 1,735,792 learners didn't make it to Advanced level school or university. Many of school dropouts join child labor and others go to streets.
